Karl Spickelmier

Karl Spickelmier was born in Denver CO on October 18th, 1942. He attended Elementary & High School in Lakewood, Colorado.

After graduation in 1966 from Western State College of Colorado in Gunnison CO, with a B.A. degree, he joined the Coast Guard. He was on Active Duty performing search and rescue missions.

In 1969, Karl was introduced to the love of his life – Shuffleboard! It happened at "The Place" in Lakewood CO. The player who influenced Karl the most, helping him to learn and enjoy the game, was to become the first Inductee into the Colorado State Shuffleboard Hall of Fame, Bill English.

Karl's career took him to Los Angeles in 1971, where he was a lost soul for six months, not finding a place to play shuffleboard. Then he met Ted Zariphes, otherwise known as Ted Z, who showed him the best shuffleboards in the area, for which he was eternally grateful.

Between 1972 & 1980, Karl met and played against many top players, including Troy Talbert, Billy Mays, Portland Eddie Graves, Billy Chiles, Jack Ahern, Vern Jones, and A.Z. Turnbo.

In 1998, the Pacific Coast Shuffleboard Association was formed by Joe Muniz, Paul Weber, and Karl Spickelmier. This trio, sometimes referred to as "the big three" of shuffleboard, organized and ran tournaments in Las Vegas. These tournaments were held for nine years and were the forerunners of the very successful multi-board tournaments being held in Del City OK and Reno Nevada.

In 1990, Shuffleboard Federation Player Policy Board chose Kark and nine other players from all over the country to make up the First National Rules Committee to develop a uniform set of shuffleboard tournament rules.

Karl was chosen by the Bowers Rating System to become one of their 60 Raters for the purpose of rating shuffleboard players across the country. Players are scored by several raters, not just one, and the ratings averaged. The very top players can be rated as a +5, while the lowest rating is a -1.50.

Very few people have made shuffleboard so large a part of their lives as this modest man, Karl. His love of shuffleboard led him on an insatiable quest to find ways to improve the game and make it more enjoyable for all, and he has been Very successful. The preceding information was taken from his California HOF Booklet since he passed away before his Induction ceremony into the TSA National Table Shuffleboard Hall of Fame.

I was working in L.A. in the early 80's when I met Karl and Ted Z. Eric Waldman and I were looking for games and we found a little bar where we could play a 4 man round robin. We met every Tuesday at 1pm and played into the night. Karl put on a clinic. He was a great player that many years ago and still is. He and Ted Z went on to win many big games and tournaments. I played him recently in Oklahoma City, he's still one of the best and deserving of this honor.

Robert Brunskill

Reviewing an old chart from The Shelter/1985, the highest percentage shooter out of 85 players was Karl with a 75.410% record. This was with a handicap of -3 (he had to play an 18-point game against some players with a handicap of 3 (they only had to play a 12-point game). This was a series of Double Elimination Singles Tournament usually held in July and December. The top 16 players qualified for the final shootout. The handicap was based on the percent of wins. Some of the opponents were Ted Zariphes, Billie Chiles, Joe Muniz, Bill Maxwell, Glen Davidson, Tory Tolbert, Eric Waldman and Roy & Jolene Lembke. The ratings were assigned as follows:

-3 top 10% / -2 next 10% / -1 next 15% / 0 next 30% / +1 next 15% +2 next 10% / +3 next 10%

Until 2008, Karl was rated a -1 in the Bowers Ratings, In the Board Talk, Karl was listed in the top 50 players (Nationally) and later in the West Coast Players top 10 listing. They changed the rules slightly in August 1986 to require a minimum of 16 teams/players for the event to qualify with the points given for the top 10 finishers in reverse order (first = 10 points...tenth = 1 point). These listings were discontinued when the Bowers Ratings became available. In many of the tournaments that Karl played in he was also involved in the bracket boards which is usually a distraction. I quit buying his Calcutta when he was working the bracket boards. I though it very interesting that when he was doing a pill draw for either partner draws of position on the bracket boards, he would insist that there was at least one witness.

Karl was selected to serve on the Shuffleboard Federations "Players Policy Board" – note that it wasn't the "Players or Promoters Policy Board".

Dan Mourgos

Karl Spickelmier is worthy of a hall of fame induction. When I started playing shuffleboard in the mid 1980's Karl was known as one of the best players in the country, often winning and placing in national tournaments and in California tournaments.

Known as a great singles and doubles player, he also excelled in money games and sessions. I learned a lot form Karl in those years, not only about strategy but also about brackets and other aspects of running tournaments.

As one of the dominant players of his era, he is a worthy addition to the National Table Shuffleboard Hall of Fame.

I first met Karl in the middle of 1980s. At a place called the Shelter. Owned and operated by Bob Brunskill. He was running a Saturday tournament which I was playing in. That's when I met the likes of not only Karl, but many other great players. After the tournament was over with Karl challenged me to a money game and I was fortunate enough to win the game. When I went to Collect Karl told me that Joe Muniz was backing him. And when I went to collect from Joe, he said in no way he was backing him. I never did collect the money, but the three of us had a Lotta fun talking about it over the many years and became good friends.

Karl had many funny habits. One of them I just have to tell you about. It was at one of the many tournaments and I saw him manipulating some money in his wallet and I just had to go ask him what he was doing. He proceeded to tell me that by manipulating a one-dollar bill that when morning came, he could tell exactly how many beers he had drank. I wanted to know what good that was. He told me that by knowing how many beers he had drank that it would tell him how many miles he would have to run that day. Karl also had a difficult time making a decision for almost anything. If you were to ask him if he would like to go have lunch he would reply, let me think about it. But if you ask him if he wanted a beer he would never ever take too long to reply, "Yes I would, thank you very much". I remember one-time Karl and I were partners in a tournament at Oscars bar and Grill in Downey, Ca. We were playing against Joe Muniz and Tony Appell. The score was 14 to 13, Joe and Tony's favor. I happen to be lagging well during the game and Tony kept telling Joe to block my right hand. I had the hammer against Joe and it was Joe's last shot and Tony yelled out again, block his right hand. Joe proceeded to put up a lefthand cross on the right rail just barely touching the one line. I then lagged a deuce with my right to go out. Tony went off on Joe like I have never seen before. I went over to Karl and said, nice game. Karl said thanks and nice lag. He asked if he could buy me a beer. I replied, let me think about it. I'll never forget that little smile as he walked away.

Karl was like a submarine most of his playing career, very quiet and under the radar. Karl played and placed in many of the larger tournaments. He played against many of the players that are currently in the national Hall of Fame. He is one of the best rail shooters that I have ever witnessed in the game of table shuffleboard.

Karl Spickelmier has had one of the most distinguished careers of anyone in Table Shuffleboard history. In addition to being a highly accomplished player, who has won many tournaments all over the West Coast and beyond, he has also mentored Southern California players for decades, who have also been successful at the tournament level.

However, Karl's achievements as a player only begin to tell the story. When the Shuffleboard Federation was founded in 1987, it established the Player Policy Board, whose function was to establish the rules under which The Federation's tournaments would be conducted. Karl was among the group of highly respected players that sat on the PPB. His integrity and well thought out analysis were invaluable in developing the initials set of rules, and in the subsequent revisions that occurred as the game continued to evolve. As one of the founders of the PCSA, Karl was involved in putting on some of the biggest tournaments in our sport during the 1980's and 1990's since the Table Shuffleboard's heyday in the 1950's.

Karl loved talking bracket theory with Rob Kern and I, and we shared many conversations on that subject over the years. He applied those bracket skills to the countless number of tournaments that he was involved with over the years, and has always been willing to help any tournament director who sought out his guidance.

In short, Karl has done it all. The enormous respect that I have for Karl was summed up in the Sol Lipkin Award, which I was proud to present to him in 2002. The text on that award reads as follows:

"Throughout your many years of involvement with our sport you have, by example, shown your fellow players what it means to be a professional in every sense of the word.

Your efforts as a member of the Player Policy Board and founding member of the P.C.S.A., the integrity and sportsmanship for which you are well known, and your long-time involvement in tournaments, both big and small, have made you a role model for your fellow players, both amateur and professional."

Congratulations, Karl, on your well-deserved honor as the newest member of the Table Shuffleboard Hall of Fame.

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


