## Russ (The Colonel) Miller May 26th, 2001 Northwest Hall of Fame Induction







RUSS (THE COLONEL) MILLER

Russ Miller was born in 1941, in a farmhouse, in Utopia Wa., in East Skagit County. His Parent's Clyde and Hazel Siddens moved the family to San Diego, it was there he graduated from Jr. High as an Honor Student. He later graduated H.S. back in Washington at Mt. Vernon. Russ was first introduced to Shuffleboard by his brother Neil, and his friend Wes Warner from Kansas City. Games then were 21 pt., keep hammer. He started off free-hand and made a few good shots!! A fellow player named Lesley said "you're a natural", and Russ was hooked on the game. In 1963 Russ was back in Washington, and played on a league as a Sub. While tending bar at the Silver Dollar, he convinced owner Dave Archer to have a team, the team did well and ..... as happens so often in this game, Dave Archer was hooked!! It was Dave who gave Russ Miller the name we know and love him by today THE COLONEL.

In 1964 Russ met the woman of his dreams, the woman he would spend his life with. Miss Sheridan Shadduck, (Sue) and together they raised three children, Russell, Rebecca and Sherry. Russ managed to work at Oil refinery's, some commercial fishing, (oh doe's he have some fishing stories!!) went to school to be a locksmith and have his own welding business for awhile, raise his family, and still had time to commit his time, love, compassion, knowledge of the true meaning to the word's "friendship through competition', to us, his "extended family", for that we are richer people. The Colonel has continued to play shuffleboard for 40 yrs. and has accomplishments all over the country, not only playing the game but promoting the game, helping it to grow, and nurturing his students in teaching them to love the game, respect the game a others, and those are the traits of a "true lover of the game". One of the event's Russ is proud to have helped orchestrate is the 'Can-Am" get together between shooters from Canada & the U.S.. The Colonel & Gordy Smith, (among others) coordinated this tourney to 6 person teams, on 6 boards, until there were about 75 shooters and even spectators making the trip to be a part of this historical event. Russ remembers many handshakes across the boarder line taking place in these event's.

Russ has traveled extensively since his first road trip in 1989 to play at the first PCSA tournament in Vegas at the Showboat casino, in 1985. He totally enjoyed going to Bourbon Indiana in 1995, as on the trip once the group of wayward travelers left Washington they never shut the engine off in Russ's van until they arrived in Bourbon.

In 1996, Colonel traveled to the "Dixie Bell" in Downey, Ca.. He has also been in tourney's in Oregon and most of the local tournament's in the Great Northwest. He has attended all of the Reno North American event's, with the exception of one. A few of his more recent travels has taken him to Del City, OK, Where the Southwest Open was both \*memorable" & \*profitable'. The Colonel is famous for his "liquid apple pie" and his "special cherry's.

His loves are, His wife and family, shuffleboard and that family, hunting, fishing, and the traveling he & Susie have been blessed with in their motorhome.
